Stimuli used in the **Practice Trials**:

Stimuli used in the **Suicide Stroop Task Trials**:

\*Note: In Cha et al. (2010) *J Abnormal*, the description of the Stroop task on pp. 617–618 should have noted that each trial started with a blank white screen for 4 s followed by a centered “+” for 1 s, another blank screen for 1 s, and then the word; and in addition to suicide-related, negative, and neutral words, 12 of the 48 test trials also included positive words (*happy, success, pleasure*). Exploratory analyses showed that there was no evidence of an attentional bias toward these positive words. All analyses and results are accurate as reported in the manuscript.
